POT PLANTS

PROPAGATION

PHOTOGRAPHY

Photographic mounts are not allowed. The edges of the photograph must be visible. No photographs to be exhibited in frames or behind glass. Nothing is to be written on the photograph or mount. Photographs to be any size but with a 25.5 cm x 30.5 cm maximum size. All photographs will be attached to display boards using Velcro tabs by our Stewards.

DECORATIVE FLOWER ARRANGING

- 75 THE ONLY WAY IS UP - an exhibit of natural plant material using only 5 flowers. Space allowed 76cm width, 69cm depth, height unlimited.
- 76 THE SPARKLE OF GLASS - an exhibit of natural plant material. Space allowed 76cm width, 69cm depth, height unlimited, accessories allowed.
- 77 DOWN A LEAFY LANE - an exhibit of natural plant material excluding flowers. Space allowed 76cm width, 69cm depth, height unlimited.
- 78 NOVICE - SPRING - an exhibit of natural plant material. Space allowed 76cm width, 69cm depth, height unlimited, accessories allowed.

COOKERY

Judge: Mrs N Ralph, Sturminster Newton

- 79 A CAKE MADE USING AT LEAST ONE VEGETABLE, to be displayed on a board, no covering required
- 80 A VICTORIA SANDWICH CAKE, made with three eggs, jam filled, to be displayed on a white paper plate and in a clear plastic bag
- 81 FIVE EASTER BISCUITS, to be displayed on a white paper plate and in a clear plastic bag
- 82 FIVE CHEESE SCONES, to be displayed on a white paper plate and in a clear plastic bag
- 83 LEMON AND ROSEMARY EASTER LOAF CAKE, to be displayed on a board, no covering required.

Ingredients:

175g butter at room temperature
175g caster sugar
3 medium eggs
200g self-raising flour
50g ground almonds
Zest and juice of 1 lemon
2tsp finely chopped rosemary

For the topping:

150g fondant icing sugar
Few rosemary sprigs with flowers, to decorate
Few coloured sugar Easter eggs, to decorate

Method:

Preheat oven to gas mark 3/160° (140°C in a fan oven). Place butter and sugar in a large mixing bowl and beat with wooden spoon or electric whisk until butter becomes a pale colour and mixture is light and fluffy.

Gradually beat in eggs, then fold in flour, ground almonds, lemon zest and juice and rosemary, until evenly mixed.

Spoon mixture into tin and bake for 1 hour, until pale golden, risen and firm to touch. Cool in tin for 10 minutes, then turn out and allow to cool completely.

To decorate, mix icing sugar with a drop or two of cold water to make a very thick pouring consistency. Drizzle over cake and decorate with rosemary flowers and eggs.
